The #1 UConn Lady Huskies (26-0) finished an undefeated regular season with a win over the Villanova women, 79-54.

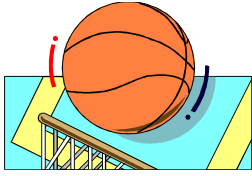

Men fall to Providence

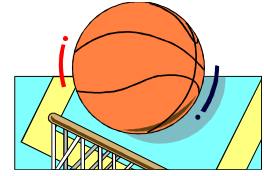

Huskies suffer third loss, second in Big East

late Connecticut rally to improve to 14-11 and 4-12 in the Big East Conference. The Huskies were prevented from clinching their second straight Big East regular-season title.

Michael Brown added 15 points and Eric Williams had 14 as the Friars avenged a 70-62 loss to Connecticut in January.

Providence got the lead to 61-48 when Troy Brown converted a three-point play with 9:31 remaining. Connecticut then went on an 8-0 run, with Brian Fair scoring four points and Ray Allen throwing down a monstrous dunk to highlight the spurt.

Connecticut got within 71-68 when Deron Sheffer scored on a layup. The teams then exchanged turnovers and Providence got the ball back on the sidelines, but Jason Murdock walked to give Connecticut a final chance.

Donny Marshall, however, missed a three-pointer from the right side with 4.4 seconds remaining. Michael Brown hit one of two free throws for a 72-68 lead and Sheffer hit an uncontested layup to end the game.

Sheffer finished with 21 points and Allen added 19 for Connecticut, which fell to 22-3 and 15-2.
