The Indians won again Wednesday night, their second stunning upset in three days, as they defeated #2-seed Norwich Free Academy, ranked third in New England.

Newington, the #6-seed in the tournament, will play for the state championship in a game Saturday at Central Connecticut State University at 4:00 PM against the only team to beat them this year, the Southington Blue Knights. Southington beat Newington by seventeen points in January and by seven in February. The Indians will hope to do better—much better—in March.

The Indians lost to the Knights in a championship game matchup three years ago. That loss ended an undefeated year for Newington, then ranked #1. The Indians will try to return the favor, and go for the first state basketball championship in school history, on Saturday.
